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The Opportunity

The Secondary Arrival provides a second significant opportunity for permanent artwork within Art for Tolworth.

Located at the secondary entrance to the new hospital, the commission centres on another prominent double-height space. It provides an opportunity to establish a distinctive creative presence at an important point of arrival and movement through the building.

We are looking for an artist or creative practitioner to develop an ambitious permanent artwork that creates a strong visual anchor and contributes meaningfully to the identity and atmosphere of the hospital.

While distinct from the Primary Arrival commission, the Secondary Arrival forms part of the same connected creative programme. We are not looking for the two commissions to share a particular visual language or aesthetic, but are interested in how each can contribute to a coherent experience of Art for Tolworth.

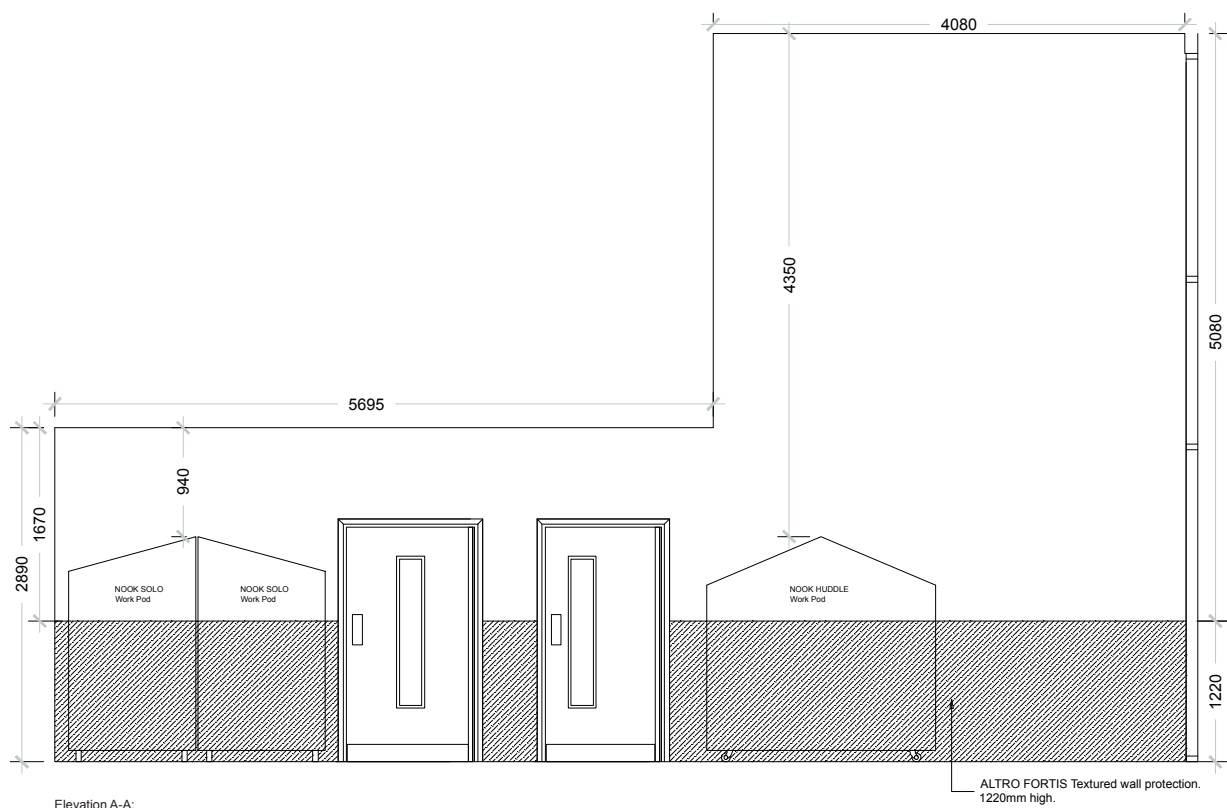
Rather than prescribing a particular artistic response, medium or visual language, we are interested in how artists respond to the qualities of the space, the people who will experience it and the wider context of Tolworth.

The commission should be developed through engagement and co-creation, allowing the final work to evolve through relationships with patients, people with lived experience, staff, carers and the wider community.

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Arrival, Connection and Discovery

The secondary entrance is the focal location for the commission, but we are also interested in how the artwork might establish relationships beyond a single space.

There is an opportunity to consider whether elements, ideas, materials or visual relationships could extend into adjacent circulation, the central spine or other connecting and shared spaces. This could involve a principal artwork with more subtle elements appearing elsewhere, a family of related interventions or another approach proposed by the artist.

We are particularly interested in the potential for the work to create moments of connection, discovery and orientation as people arrive and move onwards through the hospital.

We do not expect applicants to resolve these relationships at application stage, nor are artists required to propose work across multiple locations. The extent and form of any wider intervention should emerge through engagement, design development, technical coordination and dialogue with the wider Art for Tolworth programme.

The Secondary Arrival should remain the clear focus of the commission.

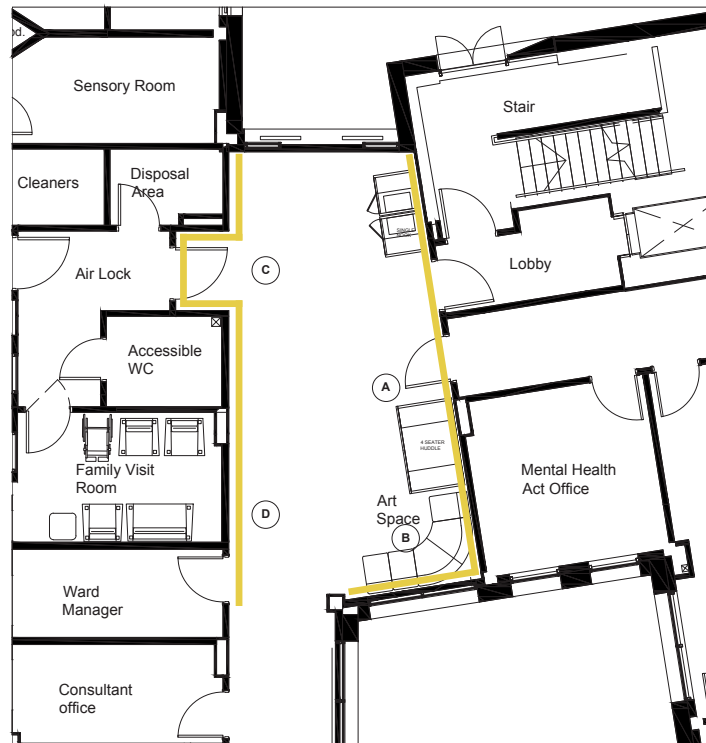
The Site

The Secondary Arrival is associated with the secondary entrance and its relationship to the central spine of the building.

As an arrival and connecting space, it provides an important point of transition between the entrance and onward movement through the hospital. Its position creates an opportunity for artwork to establish a recognisable visual anchor while also considering how people navigate and experience the wider building.

People will encounter the space for different reasons and in different emotional circumstances. The artwork therefore needs to establish a meaningful presence while responding sensitively to the environment and the different people who will experience it.

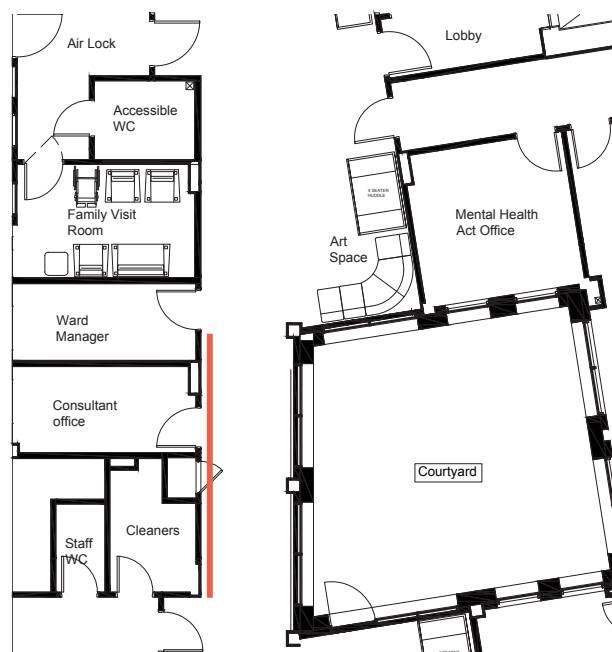


Ground Floor Plan of the Secondary Arrival.

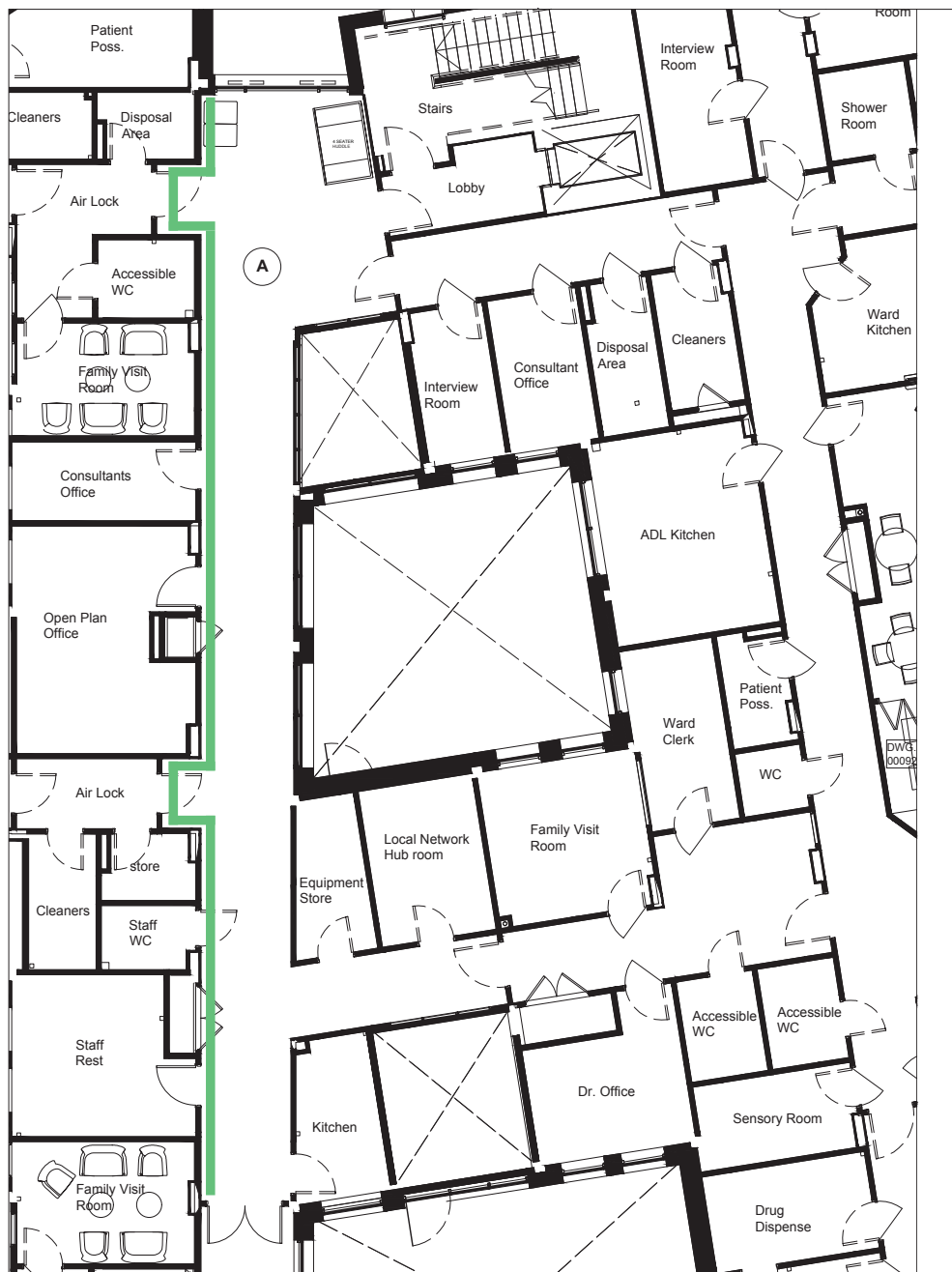


View of the adjacent corridor and wall space looking toward the Secondary Entrance

What We Are Looking For

We welcome proposals from artists and creative practitioners working across a wide range of disciplines and materials.

We are particularly interested in approaches that:

- demonstrate a strong artistic response to arrival, place and the particular character of the hospital;
- have the potential to create a distinctive and memorable permanent artwork; consider the emotional, sensory and cognitive experiences of the people encountering the work;
- demonstrate a meaningful approach to participation and co-creation; allow ideas to develop through engagement rather than presenting a completely fixed outcome at application stage;
- respond thoughtfully to Tolworth, Kingston and/or the communities the hospital serves;
- consider how the commission might establish relationships with adjacent circulation or connecting spaces;
- demonstrate an understanding of durability, maintenance, sustainability and the practical requirements of a healthcare environment;
- can be realistically developed, fabricated and installed within the available budget and programme.

We are open to different media and approaches and do not want to prescribe what the final artwork should look like.



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Co-creation and Engagement

Co-creation is a central part of Art for Tolworth and should form a meaningful part of this commission.

The appointed artist will work with The Community Brain to develop an engagement process involving relevant patients, people with lived experience, staff, carers and communities.

We are interested in approaches where participation genuinely influences the development of the artwork. This could involve conversations, workshops, collective making, research, skills sharing, material exploration or other methods appropriate to the artist's practice.

We are not asking applicants to undertake engagement before applying, nor do we expect a fully resolved artwork at this stage.

Applications should communicate a compelling artistic proposition and demonstrate how the artist would approach a collaborative design-development process following appointment.

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Working Within the Hospital

The artwork will form part of a mental health hospital and must ultimately meet the clinical, technical, accessibility, safety and maintenance requirements of the environment.

The appointed artist will work with The Community Brain, the Trust, the design team and relevant technical specialists to ensure that the artwork is appropriate for its location.

This will include consideration of materials, fixings, structural requirements, infection prevention and control, accessibility, sensory impact, durability, cleaning, maintenance, installation and relevant health and safety requirements.

We recognise that these issues cannot all be fully resolved at application stage. Detailed technical development and approvals will form part of the commissioned design process.

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Commission Budget

The total artist-facing budget for this commission is:

£13,500 inclusive of VAT

Where VAT is applicable, it must be included within this total. No additional VAT will be payable by the commissioner. The artist is responsible for their own VAT registration, tax and other statutory obligations.

The budget should cover the development and delivery of the commission, including, as appropriate:

- artist or creative fees;
- engagement and co-creation activity;
- design development;
- materials and fabrication;
- specialist or subcontractor costs;
- travel and expenses;
- installation;
- documentation and handover information;
- an appropriate project contingency.

Applicants should complete the [Art for Tolworth Artist Budget Template](#), providing an initial breakdown of how they propose to deliver the commission within the available £13,500 budget.

Please use the Notes column to explain anticipated costs and indicate whether figures are based on supplier quotations, previous experience or estimates.

We understand that costs may evolve through co-creation, technical development and coordination. The appointed artist's budget can therefore be refined as the commission develops, while remaining within the total commission value.

Fabrication and technical coordination: April to June 2027

Anticipated installation: July to August 2027

The programme may evolve in coordination with the wider hospital construction programme. Any changes affecting applicants or the appointed artist will be communicated as early as possible.



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How to Apply

We want the application process to provide enough information for us to understand your practice, approach and proposition without requiring significant unpaid design development before appointment.

Please complete the [Brief 02 Secondary Arrival Application Form](#) and provide:

1. Artist or Practice Information

A short introduction to you or your practice, together with a link to your website, portfolio or other relevant online material.

2. CV

A CV of no more than two A4 pages outlining relevant experience.

3. Your Proposal

A written submission of no more than four A4 pages, with up to two additional pages of images, drawings or relevant previous work.

Your proposal should tell us:

- your initial approach or proposition for the Secondary Arrival commission; why you are interested in working within the new Tolworth Hospital and/or a mental health setting;
- why your practice and experience are appropriate for this opportunity; how you would approach engagement and co-creation;
- any connection you have with Tolworth, Kingston or the wider area, where relevant;
- how you might approach the relationship between the principal artwork and adjacent circulation or connecting spaces;
- anything else you think is important for us to understand about your approach.

We are not looking for a fully resolved design at this stage. Drawings, sketches, references or other visual material are welcome where they help communicate your thinking, but applicants will not be assessed on producing a finished artwork proposal before appointment.

Alternatively, applicants may submit an audio or video response of up to six minutes in place of the written proposal.

Selection

Applications will initially be reviewed by The Community Brain before a shortlist is developed for further consideration with the Art for Tolworth Steering Group.

We will be looking for:

- the quality and relevance of the applicant's artistic practice;
- the strength and potential of the proposed approach;
- an understanding of the particular context of the hospital;
- a meaningful approach to co-creation and participation;
- sensitivity to accessibility, wellbeing and the needs of people using mental health services;
- the ability to develop and deliver permanent work within the available budget and programme;
- relevant experience or transferable evidence of successful delivery; the potential to contribute positively to the wider Art for Tolworth programme.

Shortlisted applicants will be invited to a conversation with The Community Brain and members of the Steering Group. The date and format will be confirmed directly with shortlisted applicants.

If further proposal or design development is requested as part of the selection process, its scope and any associated fee will be confirmed in advance.



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Access and Reasonable Adjustments

We want the application process and commission to be accessible and welcoming to artists with different access needs.

If you require a reasonable adjustment to apply for or participate in this opportunity, please let us know. This might include adjustments to the application format, additional time, communication support, access requirements or support to attend meetings or conversations.

Reasonable adjustments required by the appointed artist during the commission may also be requested in addition to the commission budget. These will be considered on a case-by-case basis, taking into account the artist's individual access needs and the requirements of the commission.
